CincyAfterSchool Offering Free Workshop For Youth Service Workers

Registration is now being accepted for free continuing education trainings to Greater Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky professionals who work with school-age children and youth. Presented by the CincyAfterSchool Network, workshops will be held August 4 to August 8 on a variety of topics relating to helping students succeed.

Each day, registrants will have a choice of many sessions to attend on areas such as after school programming, building Developmental Assets, and mental health issues. They can attend one session, or as many as they choose. Participation is eligible for continuing education credit hours. The workshops will be 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. each day, August 4 to 8, at the Hamilton County Community Action Agency (1740 Langdon Farm Rd; 45237).
